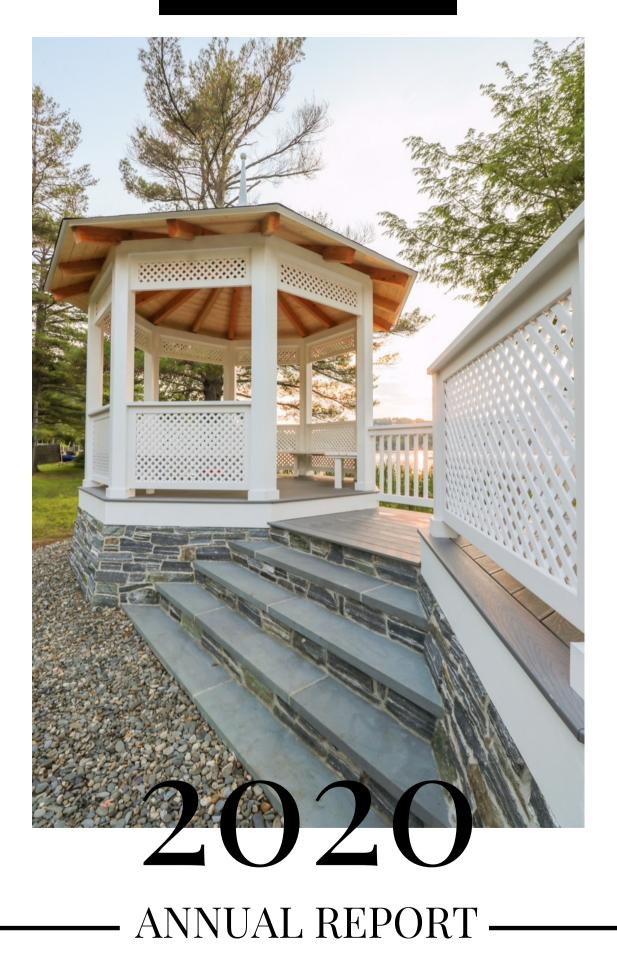

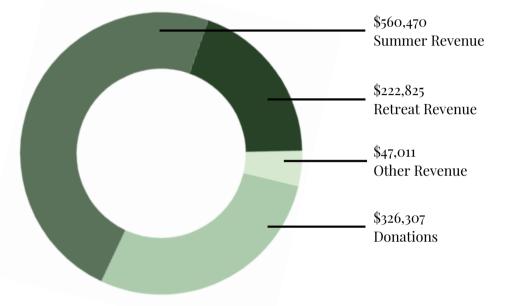

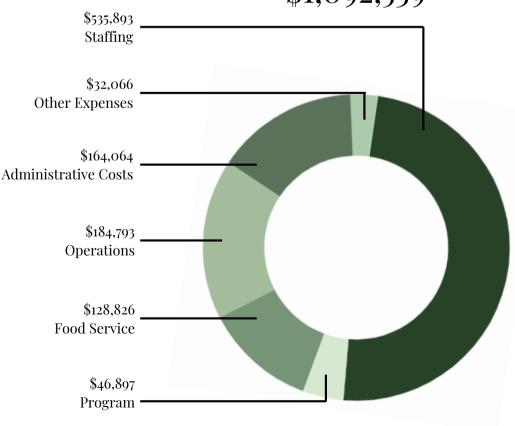

SUMMER STAFF

Because we weren't running overnight youth camp, even the counselors were able to join us. Once per week, for this one purpose, the whole youth staff was together. Never before had I witnessed such unanimous and sincere worship from our staff. It was a beautiful thing to behold week in and week out. Despite its challenges, 2020 will be a summer fondly remembered by our staff.

SPOFFORD DAY CAMP

There is a first time for everything: add that to the list of catchphrases for 2020. Back in Spring of 2020, the COVID-19 Pandemic forced us to tear down all of our normal Youth Camp plans and create something brand new that could be run safely and legally under the guidelines put in place by the State of New Hampshire. What developed was a day camp program for local campers ages 5-15. Looking back on these six weeks, I am so thankful and proud of what our team of 14 counselors pulled off. Day Camp averaged 40 campers per week, many of whom came from unchurched families. What this meant for us was a program concentrated with campers who had never heard the Gospel! We gave away about 75 bibles to kids who didn't have one, and every day our counselors were engaging in conversations with campers about Jesus. In addition, this summer brought the first sold out session of Aftershock in years. 20 young men and women decided to stay with us at camp for four weeks, growing in their faith, skills, character, and relationships with each other. There isn't enough room to tell of all the good that came from Aftershock this year, but when I tell you that many of them are still in active group chats with each other, that should reveal just how special these few weeks were! Then came the Fall. With our newfound love of day camp and knowledge on how to run one safely and effectively, we saw a chance to help the local community into the fall

season. With school districts uncertain how to bring students back to in-person classes, we offered Remote Learning Day Camp for students in grades K-8 so that parents could return to work and students could have a place to form community. We believe that sometimes sharing the Gospel with others is simply loving them as Jesus asked us to. So that's what we did. Our staff and local volunteers linked arms to help students complete their school work and rekindle friendships that went silent during quarantine. It allowed us to use our brand new Hillside Chapel for the first time too. We also learned that once you give kids a chance to win free soda, they'll never stop trying to win free soda! For obvious reasons, I pray this is a program that we never need to run again, but I feel blessed to have been a part of it. Overall, 2020 has been one of the most challenging years in youth ministry that Camp Spofford has faced. On the flip side, it has also been one of the most encouraging. We walk away from this year with hearts full of gratitude for what God did with us. With immense anticipation, we now look forward to the return of our normal programming, but now with a new sense of open-mindedness. Sometimes God gives you exactly what you thought He would, and other times he takes you on a wildly different route. Whatever the case may be for 2021, we're along for the ride.

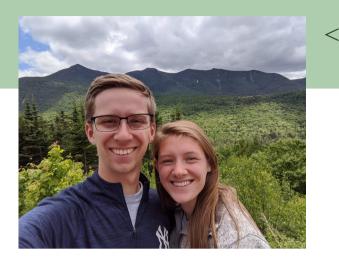
FALL RETREATS

The secret is out...

Cardamom Bread Recipe

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Mix yeast and warm water
- 2. Allow to soften for 3-4 minutes
- 3.Add 2 cups flour until smooth allow mixture to work before continuing (5-10 minutes or until bubbly)
- 4. Add salt, cardamom, brown sugar, eggs, softened butter, and 4 cups of flour
- 5. Mix and knead until well formed if it's too sticky, keep adding an additional 1/4 cup flour until dough clears the side of the bowl or is easy to handle (be careful not to add too much flour)
- 6. Cover with a towel and allow to rest for 30 minutes
- 7. Cut into 3 pieces (each will be a loaf)
- 8. Cut each of those into 3 pieces and roll out to 12" 18"
- 9. Pinch 3 of the pieces together on one end and braid 10. Once done braiding, pinch the end together
- 11. Place on well greased pan (separate each loaf by a few inches or place on different pans)
- 12. Allow to proof until doubled in size (30-90 minutes)
- 13. Mix together egg and water for topping
- 14. Brush top of loaves with egg/water mixture and sprinkle with sugar in the raw
- 15. Bake immediately at 350 degrees for 25-35 minutes or until browned and 175 degrees in the center

INGREDIENTS

- 2 cups warm water (100 -110 degrees)
- 3/4 cup brown sugar
- 2 tbsp yeast
- 6 cups bread flour (regular flour also works)
- 1/4 cup softened butter
- 3 eggs
- 3 tbsp cardamom
- 1 tbsp salt
- 1 egg
- 3 tbsp water
- 1/2 cup sugar in the raw

HELPFUL TIPS

- Put loaves in a turned off oven with a pot of just boiled water to speed up the rising process
- Try to allow the loaves to cool before cutting
